THE BLESSING OF A B MINUS The Blessing Of Strange Fruit: Big Dreams, But Whose

Continuing from last week Dr. Wendy Mogul, PhD. writes; ""Parents who transfer their disappointments onto their teenagers are falling into what is probably an age old trap. It's always been easy for parents to see teens as their last shot at realizing all their old, unlived dreams. But I think it's more common now because teens have few other obvious functions in the family. It was once standard practice for a community to harness the natural energy and bravado of teenagers, putting them to work as farmhands or domestic help or tribal guardsmen. Today most of our teens are protected from anything that looks like rough or dangerous labor. We put them to work in a different way: studying until midnight and spending all weekend at travel hockey tournaments. Their job? To bring glory and reassurance to the family. Parents rarely acknowledge these goals for their teen out loud, but if they did, they would sound something like this:

If Marnie boosts her SAT's by just a hundred points, we'll have it made. Together with the rest of her profile this will make her the star of the class. Score one for the stay-at-home-moms!

Now that Tyler is playing varsity soccer and is captain of the swim team, my father might finally appreciate that what I've done with my life measures up. Compared to his other grandchildren, there's no contest.

But living out their parent's (or parents' parents') dreams is a terrible burden for teenagers to shoulder, one as oppressive as long, hard days tilling the fields.

Some parents don't understand how clearly their disappointment is transmitted to their teenagers or how deeply it affects them. The administrator of a girls' school asked her students, "What do you want your parent to know? What do you want me to say to them at back-to –school night?" The girls replied:

"Tell them I'm trying as hard as I can and I'm not as smart as they think I am."

"I can't be good at everything."

"Don't panic if I eat one Cheeto or get one B."

One elite high school conducted a survey that included a question asking the students to name their greatest fear. The school counselor told me she expected the students to say they worried about someone in their family getting sick, or getting bad grades, or losing their friends or terrorism, or not getting into college, but the answer they gave more often than any other single answer was "My greatest fear is disappointing my parents.""

Each week, the children's and youth Sunday School classes focus on a passage from Scripture. These follow the same Revised Common Lectionary that provides readings for Sunday services. We use a curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, to tailor a lesson for each class that is interactive, fun and age appropriate. This section features the Scripture learned that week in Sunday School, along with some questions to ask about during the

☆ **Focus Scripture: Matthew 28:1-10**

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a 🛱 great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like Hightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear A of him the guards shook and became like dead Amen. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been $\stackrel{\bigstar}{\succ}$ raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, `He has been \bigstar raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead f you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my Amessage for you." So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; ☆there they will see me." \bigstar What's it all about?

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On Friday, Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James ("the other Mary") have seen Jesus' body $\overline{\mathcal{X}}$ laid in the tomb, the stone door sealed, and a guard 🕅 mounted. Now, soon after dawn on Sunday morning ("the first day of the week") they return to \bigstar see" and probably to mourn. Matthew highlights Aimportant milestones with displays of cosmic Apower, God's power: here, and when Jesus died, an "earthquake" (v. 2), which heralds the arrival of Λ "an angel", a messenger from God. The sealing of the tomb has marked death's victory, but now God's agent rolls back the door ("stone") and sits \bigstar on it – symbolizing Jesus' triumph over death. The \bigstar angel's "appearance" (v. 3) shows God's presence ☆and power ("like lightning"); his clothing is like Jesus transfigured. The guards are paralysed with "fear" (v. 4), but the angel is no threat to the

women ("Do not be afraid", v. 5). As Jesus has told his disciples ("as he said", v. 6), Jesus has risen from the dead. The disciples will see him again in Galilee. The women leave the tomb filled with awe 🛠 ("fear", v. 8) and "great joy". Jesus meets the Marys \bigstar again later (v. 9). That they "took hold of his feet" attests to his bodily resurrection. Jesus refers to the 🛧 disciples as "brothers" (v. 10): he has forgiven them $\sqrt{}$ for deserting him.
