The Feast of Pentecost

Today's lessons from the Lectionary in church are Acts 2:1-21, Psalm 104:25-35, 37, 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13, and the Gospel is John 7:37-39.

In our Godly Play class today our children will hear the story of The Mystery of Pentecost. This story is about the People of God meeting God in a new way. Something strange happened on Pentecost that had to do with "tongues" of fire and speaking so that no matter what "tongues" others spoke, they could understand what was meant. The strange event on the Day of Pentecost reminds us of the earlier day when communication was fractured so that what before had been understandable was now babel. That is why this story begins with the Tower of Babel. Heather Coyle is the Storyteller this week and Kathleen Chase is our Doorkeeper. The children will work on a special Pentecost project today.

This week is our last official Wednesday evening Youth Group meeting. We will begin with dinner at 5:30 pm this week, provided by Polly Kordinak, and then head over to Amazone for a fun filled evening of Laser Tag. The youth plan to meet occasionally during the summer for field trips.

THE BLESSING OF A B MINUS Honor Your Teen's Natural Abilities and Limitations

Dr. Wendy Mogul, PhD. writes; ""We each possess a unique set of traits given to us by God at birth, and these include talents and strengths as well as weaknesses. I, for example, am so directionally impaired that I don't know my right hand from my left or on which side of an envelope to put the stamp without looking at a previously stamped envelope to guide me. I never learned my way around my college campus, can get lost driving from my home to my office (a half mile), and my memory (immediate recall and memory for faces) is in the tenth percentile.. I have a deep and wide lack of knowledge of geography (a product of the spatial and memory impairment). On the other end of the curve, my vocabulary and reading comprehension are in the ninety-ninth percentile. I learn the lyrics to songs without effort, am pretty good skier, and have been told many times that I have good comic timing as a public speaker. I'm a package deal: strengths and weaknesses. Our children are no different.

Faith in your child means studying her God-given traits, the good as well as the quirky, and working to cherish them. Your teen won't make this easy for you. Although teens are born with innate skills and temperaments, they are also constantly changing. They need to experiment with belonging to different tribes: pothead, slacker, mathlete, Wiccan, Emo, jock. One month they are vegans and the next they are training for an eating competition, hot dog division. They are growing into adulthood, but they are also ruder and cruder and sillier than they will ever be again. Amid all the phases and transitory passions, how do you spot your teen's essential nature?

I suggest looking back to your teen's infancy and childhood. Think about how you described your baby or child to their grandparents: Was she persistent and intense? Slow-paced? A "people person" or happier when alone? Funny? Energetic? Musical? Sensitive? Chances are these attributes still form a part of your teen's natural endowment. Although I don't recommend that you put your child in a glass jar labeled "the funny one" or "the smart one," it is wise to recognize that there are some characteristics that will not change. These include but are not limited to:

Musicality Artistic inclination Natural athletic talent Taste in friends and romantic partners Love of or indifference to reading Speedy tempo or slow pace Gregariousness or shyness Preference for indoor versus outdoor activities Attraction to risk and adventure or cautiousness""

☆ In Church School this week: \bigstar

Each week, the children's and youth Sunday School classes focus on a passage from Scripture. These follow the same Revised Common Lectionary that provides readings for Sunday services. We use a curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, to tailor a lesson for each class that is interactive, fun and age appropriate. This section features the Scripture learned that week in Sunday School, along with some questions to ask about during the

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Focus Scripture: John 17:1-11

On the last day of the festival, the great day, while Jesus was standing there, he cried out, "Let anyone $\overset{\frown}{\times}$ who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who $\overleftarrow{\times}$ believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, `Out \bigstar of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water." Now he said this about the Spirit, which Helievers in him were to receive; for as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified. ~From the Lectionary Page

What's it all about?

Each day during the "festival" of Booths \bigstar (Tabernacles), water has been carried from the Pool \bigstar of Siloam to the Temple, as a reminder of the water \bigstar which sprang forth from the rock in the wilderness. Hesus now reinterprets the water: he is the "living" \checkmark water" (v. 38); he relieves the thirst of the believer. The Greek translated "the believer's heart" means fliterally his belly, i.e. his very being. Who is he? ^{*}Either "the one who believes" or Jesus is intended. $\overleftarrow{\times}$ In v. 39, John says that the "living water" is "the Holy] Spirit". "As yet there was no Spirit" caused theological difficulties for early interpreters and Atranslators; some appended given. (The text as we Ahave it appears to be original.) The Holy Spirit, existing since before time (as stated elsewhere in the book), will come to believers when Jesus has died, risen and ascended ("glorified"). They will $\overleftarrow{\times}$ receive the Spirit, and make it available to others. \mathbf{x} (The quotation is not in the Old Testament.) From Revised Common Lectionary Chris Haslam 1996-2014

I will sing to the LORD as long as I live; * I will praise my God while I have my being.


