Today our lessons from the Lectionary are 1 Kings 19:9-18, Psalm 85:8-13, Romans 10:5-15, and the gospel is Matthew 14:22-33.

This week the children will hear The Story of Jacob. This story focuses on the person, Jacob, who the angel named Israel. It introduces the origin of the twelve tribes of Israel. Weather permitting the children will go outside following the story for outdoor activities.

THE BLESSING OF A B MINUS Gain Perspective On The College Admissions Frenzy

Dr. Wendy Mogul, PhD. writes; ""You can study your teenager's temperament, and you can accept the ups and downs of adolescent development, but unless you can disengage from the college admissions frenzy, you will find it difficult to allow your child to bloom in his own way, on his own schedule. You'll be too caught up in the belief that every choice your child makes, starting around age twelve, will be reflected on the all-important college application.

It's true that the world has changed since you and I were young. Middle school is more academically rigorous, high school is harder, and college admissions are more competitive. But our generation's particular challenge as parents is to acknowledge this reality without exaggerating it. Let's start with the myth that only students who attend the most selective, highest-in-the-U.S. News-poll schools can achieve real success. In his 2004 Atlantic article "Who Needs Harvard?" Greg Easterbrook cites admissions officers who believe that there are about a hundred colleges that deliver the same quality education as what Easterbrook calls the top-of-the-list "glamour" schools. He also describes a 1999 study, conducted by Alan Krueger of Princeton and Stacy Berg Dale of the Andrew Mellon Foundation, of students who were accepted at Ivy League schools but chose to go elsewhere because of better financial aid packages, a location closer to home, or other advantages. Twenty years after graduation, these students made as much money as their Ivy League peers.

Lloyd Thacker, the author of *College Unranked*, is a former college admissions officer and the founder of the Education Conservancy, a nonprofit organization with the mission of restoring sanity to the college application process. Its motto? "Collectively we have robbed students of their senior year." Thacker says it is the *student* who contributes most significantly to the educational payoff, not the college. The most reliable predictors of adult success are not grades in high school or a collegiate pedigree. They are the qualities that psychologist Daniel Goleman calls emotional intelligence: empathy, optimism, flexibility, a good sense of humor, the capacity to function as a team member, and a positive reaction to setbacks. ""

One teaching that resonated with readers of *The Blessing of a Skinned Knee* is the Chassidic proverb "If your child has talent to be a baker, don't ask him to be a doctor." Your child needs a post-high school experience that is a good fit for his temperament, needs, and talents. You want him to explore his interests, form supportive friendships, and stretch toward maturity. This means accepting that your child might actually want to be a baker, not a business whiz, and go to cooking school, not Stanford.""

In Church School this week:

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Each week, the children's and youth Sunday School classes focus on a passage from Scripture. These follow the same Revised Common Lectionary that provides readings for Sunday services. We use a curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, to tailor a lesson for each class that is interactive, fun and age appropriate. This section features the Scripture learned that week in Sunday School, along with some questions to ask about during the week.

Focus Scripture: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the And, for the wind was against them. And early in ★the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the →sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." ☆So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. But when he noticed ★the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, ≒saying, "Truly you are the Son of God." From the Lectionary Page

☆What's it all about?

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This story is in a section on instructing the disciples About their mission. It is a story of miracles - there is no limit to what God can do - and of the power of faith: the disciples can do the seemingly impossible if they have sufficient faith.

resus has just fed the crowd, in the miracle of the ☆loaves and fish. He compels the disciples to embark (v. 22); presumably the miracle has aroused ☆popular enthusiasm – in terms of political freedom rather than faith. Because the Sea of Galilee is shallow, storms arise rapidly. It was "early in the morning" (v. 25); from the Greek, we know it was

before dawn. Walking on water was beyond the disciples' experience, so they are afraid that they are seeing a ghost. The three miracles are: Jesus walking on water, Peter doing the same, and the wind ceasing abruptly - that Matthew mentions it (v. 32) shows that he believed it to be a miracle. Jesus brings outward and inner calm, and a deeper 🖈 faith. The disciples acknowledge him as "Son of God" (v. 33) for as God did at the time of creation, Jesus controls the waters, then believed to be chaotic and evil. Jesus is God's agent of renewal. ~From Revised Common Lectionary
