Today our lessons from the Lectionary are Isaiah 56:1,6-8, Psalm 67, Romans 11:1-2a,29-32, and the gospel is Matthew 15:10-28.

During the summer there will be a Godly Play Story time for the younger children ages 3 to 7 or grades Pre-k – 2nd. Older children ages 8 and above will attend church with their parents. This week the children will hear The Story of Joseph. Joseph was a leader, a dreamer and an interpreter of dreams. This story addresses the famine in Egypt and how Joseph communicated with God through dreams, stayed close to God, and listened to him. He told the Pharaoh and the People of God to save grain, but they were jealous and sold him into slavery. Kathleen Chase is our Storyteller this week. Weather permitting the children will go outside following the story for outdoor activities.

Please mark your calendars now for our upcoming Parent Meeting, next Sunday, August 24 following our 10 am service. THE BLESSING OF A B MINUS Top Measuring And Comparing

Dr. Wendy Mogul, PhD. writes; ""Our society measures teenagers at every turn: Are you good? Better? Best? What's your rank? Shall we select you or reject you? What will you major in? Music. Music and what else?

Even for kids who rank at the top of every field and are accepted to the college of their choice, this brutal measurement process feels like the opposite of acceptance. It tells them they are only as good as their last test score. By constantly criticizing our teens, we send the message that we, too, are constantly measuring and comparing.

Sometimes the best way to show acceptance of your teen is to bite your tongue. Try not to pollute interactions with your teen with constant suggestions for improvement:

Yes, a B plus is fine. But remember, I suggested that highlighting the book and making a written outline might have been a better approach.

Did you know that twenty minutes of aerobic exercise every day significantly enhances brain function?

You've got another paper coming up next week, so consider getting started a bit earlier this time...and, by the way, too many carbs can make you sleepy.

Instead, let affirmation---"Yes, a B plus!---stand happily alone.

Some parents sneak in criticism by disguising it as encouragement, by upping the ante every time their child does something well. This is the "What about varsity?" school of parenting. If the child is a good listener, we encourage her to join the school peer support team. If she makes second chair in the orchestra, we suggest that next year she aim for first. If he plays a team sport at school, why not move up to a club sport? If junior varsity, why not go all the way?

Perhaps the best and most radical way to stop measuring and comparing your teen is to keep yourself from mentioning college before the eleventh grade. Clench your teeth if you have to. Every year at the back-to-school night for parents of tenth graders at the Oakwood School in Los Angeles, dean Erin Studer gives the parents two messages: "Don't talk about college this year *at all*, and remember, they aren't very good drivers yet even if they have a license." I agree.""

In Church School this week:

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Each week, the children's and youth Sunday School classes focus on a passage from Scripture. These follow the same Revised Common Lectionary that provides readings for Sunday services. We use a curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, to tailor a lesson for each class that is interactive, fun and age appropriate. This section features the Scripture learned that week in Sunday School, along with some questions to ask about during the week.

Focus Scripture: Matthew 15:10-28

Jesus called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the thind. And if one blind person guides another, both will ☆fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, Afalse witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."]

Jesus left Gennesaret and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

From the Lectionary Page

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Pharisees have come to Jesus asking why his disciples break the oral law, which they believe to be God-given and to have equal status with Mosaic Law: why do they not wash before eating? (v. 2) He has pointed out to them that at times they give priority to the oral law over the biblical Law. The Pharisees teach rules of human, rather than divine, origin.

Now (v. 10) he tells the crowd a "parable" (v. 15), a saying with a hidden meaning. He sees moral behaviour ("out of the mouth", v. 11) as important, not food laws ("into the mouth"). When the disciples point out that he \d has offended the Pharisees (v. 12) by his reply to their question, he is blunt: do not follow them; being "blind" (v. 14), they and their followers will be judged adversely ("pit"). When Peter asks for an explanation, Jesus addresses all the disciples ("you", v. 16, is plural). What 🖈 is eaten, Jesus says, even though ritually clean, ends up unclean ("sewer", v. 17), so food laws are unimportant (in spite of being in the Law). The "mouth" (v. 18) was seen as the channel by which the "heart", the very being, expressed itself. Immoral behaviour ("evil intentions ..." v. 19) does alienate one from God ("defile", v. 20) but breaking laws of human origin does not. $\stackrel{\wedge}{\Rightarrow}$

Now a "Canaanite" (v. 22) woman, from Phoenicia ("Tyre ...", v. 21) and probably a Gentile, calls for help. She recognizes him as the Messiah ("Lord, Son of David", v. 22). Even though the disciples advise sending her away and Jesus says that his mission is to "Israel" (v. 24), she manages to kneel before him (v. 25). He tests her (v. 26): the "children" are Jews, their "food" the gospel, and "the dogs" the Gentiles. Her answer, that he can still help her, demonstrates her faith in him.
