Today our lessons from the Lectionary are Isaiah 56:1,6-8, Psalm 67, Romans 11:1-2a,29-32, and the gospel is Matthew 15:10-28.

THE BLESSING OF A B MINUS Treasure Your Homely, Holy Teen

Dr. Wendy Mogul, PhD. writes; ""The Jewish holiday of Sukkot commemorates the Israelites' long hard trip through the desert after leaving Egypt. To prepare for the festivities each family heads out to the backyard or apartment balcony and builds a sukkah, a rickety hut resembling the makeshift desert shelters of the Israelites. In a nightly ritual, each person waves around a long, graceful cluster of palm, laurel, and myrtle fronds while cradling a funny-looking, thick-skinned, bumpy, yellow citrus fruit called an etrog.

If you want a real spiritual lesson during Sukkot,, think of the etrog as your teenager. The etrog is misshapen and expensive, but one of the pleasures of Sukkot is the love you show it. Even the word itself, etrog, is Aramaic for "delight." Each family takes great care in selecting the proper etrog, which can cost between ten and one thousand dollars, (It's true. Ask a rabbi.) Then you bring your etrog home, swaddled in fluffy batting in a simple white cardboard box. During the weeklong holiday, the family performs a ritual in the sukkah, saying prayers to thank God for the miracle of the Exodus, the gathering of the family, and the cycle of festivals. My favorite moment is when the family opens the box holding the etrog. Everyone looks and says, "Oh, it's beautiful!" You speak the words while battling a strong sense of cognitive dissonance, since you just spent forty dollars on a lemon, but also with genuine love for a religious tradition that gets you out of the house and involved in such serious, holy silliness.

Every etrog is homely, and every etrog is cherished and elevated and given a starring role for a whole week, every year, every place in the world where Jews celebrate their holidays. You don't need to wave palm fronds at your teen. But there is value in cherishing her not just for who she was as an infant or for what she will one day become, but for what she is now, in all her lumpy, bumpy glory.

As a spiritual exercise, try to cultivate appreciation for your teen---not just for what you find easy to love about her, but for what you don't. What are the most upsetting signs of her rejection of you, of her clannishness with her friends, of her immaturity? Her taste in music might be a good place to begin. Remember when you had to read daunting classics in high school or college but found, to your surprise, that after fifty pages you were inhabiting the author's world and delighting in it, that you had found the rhythm and beauty?""

In Church School this week:

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Each week, the children's and youth Sunday School classes focus on a passage from Scripture. These follow the same Revised Common Lectionary that provides readings for Sunday services. We use a curriculum, Seasons of the Spirit, to tailor a lesson for each class that is interactive, fun and age appropriate. This section features the Scripture learned that week in Sunday School, along with some questions to ask about during the week.

Focus Scripture: Matthew 16:13-20

[When Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still thers Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to ☆them, "But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter ☆answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the ☆living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are ✓you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has unot revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on Rearth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you ☆loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that the was the Messiah.

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☆What's it all about?

religious has warned his disciples about religious Aleaders who can foretell the weather but "cannot ☆interpret the signs of the times" (v. 3); they ★influence others, leading them astray. The only sign of the new era will be his resurrection ("sign of "Jonah", v. 4). Beyond the reach of Herod Antipas' spies, he is free to talk. He asks his disciples: who do people say that I am? Herod thinks that he is "John the Baptist" (v. 14); "Elijah" was expected to return at the end of time; "Jeremiah" foretold rejection and suffering. Jesus is seen as a prophet, a ☆spokesman for God. When Jesus asks the disciples ★the same question (v. 15), Peter has a vital insight, which "my Father" (v. 17), not humans ("flesh and →blood"), has revealed to him.

☆Vv. 18-19 are particularly thorny, for they are ☆overloaded with the issue of papal authority; I seek ★to avoid this issue. It is clear that:

if Jesus spoke in Aramaic, "Peter" and "rock" are both cephas;

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in Greek, the words are petros and petra, so there may be word-play;

Jesus switches from "Simon" (v. 17, the formal name) to "Peter" (v. 18, his nickname);

"Hades" was the place of the dead, so the "church" will survive Jesus' death;

in the Greek, "you" is singular throughout vv. 18-19; and "bind" (v. 19) and "loose" are rabbinic terms for forbid and permit in a juridical sense; in 18:18-19 these powers are conferred on any two of the apostles. The "rock" (v. 18) may be

Peter's insight of Jesus as Christ ("Messiah", v. 16) that God does reveal to church leaders; Peter; or the disciples (if Jesus paused after the second clause of v. 18).

Jesus gives Peter "the keys" (v. 19), the ability to unlock the mysteries of the Kingdom; they may also be a symbol of authority over the Church. In v. 20, Jesus "sternly" orders the disciples to keep the insight quiet, lest people grasp it in a political way. 🛧 ~From Revised Common Lectionary Chris Haslam 1996-2014
